**SENIOR TEAM** The team maths challenge took place on Wednesday 20th November at the University of Nottingham. 20 schools from around the county took part and our team of Kira Toplis (Y12), Isaac Wilde (Y12) Aaron Greenfield (Y13) and James Kirk (Y13) worked hard to prepare in the run up to the competition. The competition is made up of three sections, a group round with 10 challenging problem solving questions, a cross number to complete (think crossword but with all numerical answers) and a relay round where they split into pairs and have to pass answers back and forth and finish before the time is up. They did themselves and the school proud with a very respectable 4th place finish, narrowly missing a place on the podium. They were only 13 points (out of 186) behind the second placed team. Well done Team Kimberley!



**SENIOR** This year a record number of sixth form students took part in the senior maths challenge. Students have 90 minutes to complete 25 fiendishly difficult maths problems and are only allowed a pencil and paper for working out (they are not even allowed squared paper in case this is useful). 27 students took part and over half achieved an award for their performance. 2 gold, 8 silver and 7 bronze awards were made, so not a bad haul! Romany Whittall achieved the best score in Year 13 and Isaac Wilde scored highest in Year 12 and both qualified for the next round of the competition called the Senior Kangaroo. This took place on Friday 29th November and they both enjoyed the challenge of this competition. The papers have been sent off for marking and we are waiting to hear how they got on. One of my favourite questions from the challenge is below for your enjoyment. Congratulations to all involved.

## A Message from the Head Teacher

Sometimes, in the day to day life of a school, there are moments that remind you what we are here for. In the last few weeks I have had two such moments that remind me of what it is everyone in this school is trying to achieve. As a Head Teacher of a complex organisation it is often difficult to see the positive impact of the decisions that you make. Anyone in a similar role will know that the world is full of people who are predisposed to telling you what is going wrong, so seeking out those moments where you can celebrate success is really important.

The first moment was the Christmas Music Concert at the start of December. Two and a half years ago we appointed a Musician in Residence to lead on creating opportunities for students to learn an instrument and to perform in front of audiences. Thanks to Jodi Calder's work there are many, many students taking part in these opportunities across the school. At the concert I counted that there were over 100 students all of whom had the confidence to step up, take a risk and perform in front of an appreciative and supportive audience. The impact that this will have on them, their self-esteem and their confidence is not measurable by any league table performance measure but it is invaluable.

The second moment was last night at the Year 13 Leavers' Celebration Evening. This is the ceremony we introduced two years ago when last years' Year 13 come back to school to celebrate their achievements. All of the students receive their certificates in a graduation ceremony. There are also individual awards for subject achievements and wider contributions to the school and sixth form. Each and every student last night was there to celebrate something special that they had achieved. They had done so because of their hard work, the support of their families and staff at Kimberley School. Their futures are bright and the world is an exciting place for them.

These two small events are only part of what is happening every day at Kimberley School. They remind me how proud I am to be a small part of this story. I hope you enjoy reading the newsletter and it gives you a flavour of what is going on at the school. We also continue to welcome the Careers Service in to school to work with the 6th Form on an individual basis, as well as to run apprenticeship workshops for both Year 12 and 13 students. The work they do on apprenticeships has been complemented by visits from ex students who are now involved with successful apprenticeship programmes. We were very fortunate to have a workshop for Year 13 students run by Rolls Royce in November, explaining the types of apprenticeships available to students who gain excellent A levels but don't feel university is the best route forward.

In the New Year we will welcome back TFTF to deliver talks around Money and Understanding Mental Health as well as having a Positive Mind Set.

## Year 12 Career Thinking



On Tuesday 5th November, we took 83 eager Year 9 students on a four-day residential visit to France and Belgium to explore the Battlefields of the First World War. After a long and tiring coach journey, we arrived at our hotel. The staff greeted us on the driveway and showed us to our rooms before we ate our evening meal. After dinner the hotel staff took over, allowing our students to explore the grounds of the Chateau in a scavenger hunt, whilst some enjoyed a campfire (with obligatory toasted marshmallows!).

students were taken on a guided tour by fantastic interns from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, and walked through preserved trenches – which were created by Canadian forces in July 1916. Our long day on the Somme ended with a competitive bowling experience.

On Thursday, we gave students a short lie-in before heading over to Belgium for the day. Our aim was to investigate the experiences of soldiers fighting in the Ypres Salient, which saw heavy fighting throughout



The next day began bright and early with some very tired faces ready for breakfast! After a rest on the coach, we arrived for our first excursion on the Somme: Lochnagar Crater. The crater was formed on the morning of 1st July 1916, when – in an attempt to break the stalemate of the war- a series of British mines under the German front lines were blown. Our students were told stories of Privates George Nugent and Clement Cunnington, who both died in the first few minutes of the Battle of the Somme. We later found their graves in the town's cemetery.

Our two coaches then split up to investigate the Thiepval Memorial and the Newfoundland Memorial Park. Here

the war, especially in 1917 (commonly referred to as Passchendaele).

Our first stop was the town of Poperinge. Poperinge was behind the front lines throughout the war, and was used by the British Army as the site of their headquarters. The Town Hall still contains cells used to imprison British soldiers accused of 'cowardice'. Our students were fascinated by the graffiti on the walls of the cells, made by British soldiers over 100 years ago whilst they were waiting to be 'shot at dawn' for desertion or cowardice.

We then headed over to Lijssenthoek cemetery, where











we told the stories of some of the individuals buried there; including two men who lived and worked in Kimberley before the war.

Thursday afternoon. We spent some time at Tyne Cot Cemetery — the largest Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery in the world. Our students spent the time looking for names of their relatives and taking in the tranquility and enormity of the site. We then continued to Hill 62. Here we explored the well-preserved (albeit muddy) trenches at Sanctuary Wood Museum.

Our day ended in the historic city of Ypres. We first headed to Leonidas chocolate shop, which had opened exclusively for us, before giving students some free time to explore and eat! Later that evening we took part in the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate. The city falls silent each night to remember those who died in the First World War.

Our final morning started with some rest (after the very late night before)! Year 9 had a final chance to explore the hotel; playing hide and seek and football after finishing packing. We were congratulated by the hotel's owner for the immaculate condition in which we left our rooms!

Our final historical excursion was Étaples Cemetery, the largest in France. Here, our students took some time to reflect on their visit, each choosing a soldier's headstone by which to place a poppy tribute.


We finally held a short remembrance ceremony, led by Mr Clegg, where four of our students laid wreaths. After the all-important stop at a hypermarket, we headed to Calais for our ferry, and then home to Nottingham (ahead of schedule!).

This was the largest residential visit we have done at Kimberley, and we were immensely proud of our students throughout the entire visit; they represented the school and the country fantastically, learning a lot
